

Make the most of the Shakespeare season

To mark the 400th anniversary of Shakespeare's death, the BBC has launched a special Shakespeare Festival.

This landmark series of programmes on TV and radio covers everything – from adaptations of the plays, documentaries about the life of the writer, and even comedy inspired by the Bard.

The huge range of programming will be a great resource for teachers looking for supporting material for lessons, or those looking for a fresh take on the classic plays.

The breadth of content means that there is something for everyone: the *Horrible Histories: Shakespeare Special* (scheduled to air on the 19th April) would be great for introducing the playwright to Primary

pupils, whilst the BBC School Radio music workshop production of *Macbeth* (available online now) features eight songs following the story of the Scottish Play.

Secondary students will find the all-star cast of *The Hollow Crown* (including Benedict Cumberbatch and Keeley Hawes) an appealing draw to the *Histories*. (The series will start on 7th May with Part One of *Henry VI*.)

Missed a programme? The ERA Licence covers the use of BBC iPlayer, and various clips from programmes are often left on the microsites.

By holding an ERA Licence, you can record any of the programmes broadcast across the Shakespeare Festival, and create an amazing archive of material for use in the classroom – as (and when!) you like it.

How does ERA support Education?

SCHOOLS IN ENGLAND are licensed either centrally by the DfE, or in the case of Independent Schools, via the Centre for Education and Finance Management (CEFM).

Staff can make copies of programmes, store these on a central server, or access clips from broadcaster on-demand services or websites.

The diversity of programmes available on TV and radio ensures that there is a constant and ever-changing selection of

resources for educators to use in lessons.

To support 'flipped learning', the ERA Licence means that students can be directed to watch an adaptation or range of clips in their own time, so that the discussion can begin straightaway in the lesson.

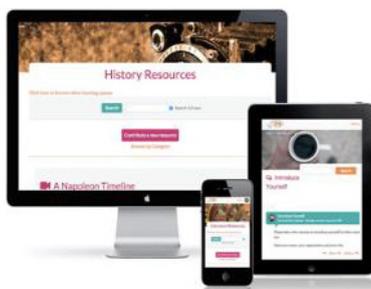
Watching programmes outside the classroom increases student/teacher interaction time inside the classroom.
